HAWAIIAN ISLANDS HUMPBACK WHALE NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY HOSTS LECTURE

The Kā'ono'ulu Story: One thousand years of history

Join us for a historical slide show and community talk story focusing on the colorful history of one of South Maui's most culturally important traditional settlements areas, Kā'ono'ulu ahupua'a. The slide show will be facilitated by local historical researchers, Lucienne de Naie and Daniel Kanahale. Lucienne works as freelance journalist, grant writer and historical researcher and serves on many local non-profit boards.

The place name Kā'ono'ulu today is best known as the name of an upcountry famous ranch. It is also used as another name for South Maui's best known fishpond ("Kalepolepo or Kō'ie'ie fishpond") in front of the Hawaiian Islands Humpback Whale National Marine Sanctuary.

The Kā'ono'ulu area once had its own post office (1856-1875) and was an important trading center during kingdom days. Its traditional history is linked to many of Maui's great chiefs and the legendary Menehune and spans nearly a millennium. Enjoy an illustrated slide show of the historical and cultural sites that still remain to tell the Kā'ono'ulu story.
